Humber receives funding

FOR LEARNING RESOURCE COMMONS

Earlier this year, a packed crowd of students, faculty and staff gathered as the provincial government announced that Humber College will receive a large grant toward building a new student services centre at the college's North Campus.

Dr. Shafiq Qaadri, MPP for Etobicoke North, announced that Humber is the recipient of \$64.1 million from the Ontario government for a \$91.5 million development project. The centre will be the new gateway to the campus.

The new Learning Resource Commons and Student Services Centre will enable Humber's North Campus to accommodate 2,200 additional students. The six-storey, 240,000 square-foot structure will feature group and independent study spaces along with enhanced library and customer services. The development will also provide the opportunity to restructure the campus roadways to allow public transit vehicles to drop off and pick up passengers on campus.

"Humber is the fastest growing Ontario college with the highest applicant demand in the province," says Humber President, John Davies. "This grant will help us continue to provide our students with modern facilities and a high quality educational experience that prepares them for their future careers." The project is anticipated to break ground in early 2012 with completion expected in September 2014.

President announces retirement Humber President, John Davies, has announced plans to retire at the end of the 2011–2012 academic year. Look for our next edition of Humber dialogue as Davies reflects on his time at Humber and how his leadership has contributed to shaping the college's future.

Faculty achievements

Humber Theatre Performance professor, Diana Belshaw, was awarded the 2011 Maggie Bassett Award by Theatre Ontario. The award is presented annually to an individual who has made a sustained and significant contribution to the development of theatre in the province. An actor and director for more than 40 years, Belshaw has worked at theatres across Canada.

Elizabeth J. Duncan's third novel. A Killer's Christmas in Wales was recently published. Her first novel, The Cold Light of Mourning, won the William F. Deeck-Malice Domestic Grant and the St. Martin's Press/ Malice award and was nominated for two major mystery writing awards, the Arthur Ellis and the Agatha. Duncan is a Humber graduate and an instructor in Humber's Public Relations and Humber School for Writers programs.

Humber writing instructor, Jeff Latosik, has won the Trillium Book Award for English-language poetry. The \$10,000 award is presented annually by the Ontario government. The province's leading award for literature, the prize recognizes writing excellence and fosters increased public awareness of the quality and diversity of Ontario writers.

John Steckley, professor of sociology and anthropology, has recently written a new and distinctly Canadian textbook, Introduction to Physical Anthropology. The book, published by Oxford Press, is designed to allow students to explore basic and advanced anthropological concepts.



Student successes

Students in a wide cross-section of Humber programs are already



(Electromechanical Engineering Technology - Automation and Robotics) are the top mechatronics students in Canada after winning gold at both the provincial and national levels of the Skills Canada 2011 competition. Mechatronics

concerns the design and building of Automated PLCcontrolled electromechanical systems. Skills Canada is a

national, not-for-

profit organization that promotes skilled trades and technology careers among Canadian youth.

Hania Arafat (Bachelor of Applied Arts - Interior Design) worked with instructor Bettina Takacs on the redesign of the Great Lakes Brewery building's storefront and public entrance. Great Lakes, the oldest craft brewery in Toronto, approached Humber looking for innovative designs that would mesh well with the current architecture. The brewery plans to implement many of Arafat's and Takacs' design suggestions.

Mark DeBonis (Comedy Writing and Performance) beat out 64 competitors from across Canada to win the 2011 Yuk Yuk's Great Canadian Laugh-Off contest held in Toronto. The win includes a \$25,000 cash prize and a Comedy Network Special.

Top marks

According to the 2010-2011 KPI* survey, Humber is the Greater Toronto Area's number one college for graduate satisfaction and, for student satisfaction, number one for teaching and learning. The school also has the highest graduation employment rate among GTA colleges.

This fall, Humber was named one of Canada's Top Employers for Young People for 2011 by Mediacorp Canada Inc., as part of its annual competition. Recognized employers are considered Canada's leaders in attracting and retaining younger employees to their organizations.

This past spring, Humber public relations students put their heads together and created TEDxHumberCollege, the first ever TEDx event held at a Canadian college. Titled More Than Words, the team brought together speakers from the Humber community - faculty, alumni and students - whose passionate ideas, innovative projects and compelling stories reflected emerging concepts in communication. The event was attended by an audience of more than 100 people, was watched live online by several hundred and became a top Twitter trend across Canada. Independently-organized TEDx events are held throughout the world, created in the spirit of TED's mission of "ideas worth spreading".

distinguishing themselves in their chosen fields:

Sophie Doria (Culinary Management and Apprentice) won gold at the Canadian Culinary Federation's Junior Culinary Competition in Ontario and then represented the province at the nationals in Vancouver, where she placed third. She also placed second at Skills Canada and Commis Rotisseur – Jeune Chaine chef competitions. After graduating, Doria was one of five Humber students selected to cook for Prince William and Princess Catherine during their visit to Canada.

Regis Dudley (Public Relations) was named the International Association of Business Communicators (IABC)/Toronto 2011 Student of the Year. The award, which recognizes an IABC student member's excellence in communication, includes a cash prize of \$500.

Dudley also had her work published in the OVATION Award Winning Entries Booklet.

Chris Rennie (Bachelor of Applied Music – Contemporary Music) was awarded the Galaxie Rising Stars top scholarship of \$1,500 at the TD Ottawa International Jazz Festival. The saxophonist performed with the TD Jazz Youth Summit.

Amanda Richer (Film and Television Production) was named best Canadian filmmaker at the Toronto International Deaf Film and Arts Festival (TIDAF). Richer, who has a hearing disability, directed Marianne Matters, a subtitled, eight-minute documentary about one woman's battle with schizophrenia and the steadfast dedication of her sister.

Powell** is a Humber alumnus and has taught at the school for nine years including having the role of program co-ordinator for the Practical Nursing program. learning BEYOND BORDERS



hen it comes to the global community, Humber's international credentials never fail to impress. Whether it's through internationally focused programs, study/work abroad options, supporting internationally trained professionals, or faculty teaching overseas, the international reach of the Humber community stretches far and wide. No surprise for a school already celebrated for its diversity, with more than a third of students and staff born outside of Canada.

Humber's worldwide connections offer unparalleled opportunities to engage in global citizenship, build on an area of study, practise a foreign language, and acquire experience for a future career. The list of international programs and partnerships is exhaustive. Here are just a few noteworthy examples.

Humber-Ningbo-Jimei partnership

What it is: A program in international business for students from China. Students take their first two years at Ningbo or Jimei University in China and receive a Humber Business Management diploma. In their second year, they are taught by both Humber and Ningbo/Jimei professors. Many travel to Canada for a third year at Humber, earning them a diploma in Business Administration.

Wow factor: Students come from as far away as Shanghai, Tibet, and Mongolia to gain exposure to international business practices in two countries. Launched in 1996, the program is considered one of the longest running and most successful postsecondary programs linking Canada and China.



Humber music partnerships with South Korea and France

What it is: Humber's Music program has partnerships with two renowned music schools overseas: the Paekche Institute for the Arts in South Korea, and the Paris Conservatory in France. After completing two years at their home institutions, highly talented young musicians who qualify, travel to Canada to complete Humber's Bachelor of Applied Music - Contemporary Music degree.

Wow factor: Humber's Music program has a long tradition of attracting students from around the world thanks to its excellent reputation as one of the foremost music schools in North America. In addition to welcoming students from South Korea and France, Humber has recently hosted young virtuosos from Columbia, Brazil, Mexico, Sweden, Australia, South Africa and the UK.

International business certificates and degrees

What they are: Humber offers three programs for students interested in an international career: postgraduate certificates in International Development and International Marketing, and a four-year degree in International Business. The school will also offer an International Development degree beginning in 2012-2013.

Wow factor: Students taking the International Business degree have the option to study for a semester in the United States, Ireland, Austria, Germany, Japan, or New Zealand. In the International Development certificate, every student completes a work placement at a well-known humanitarian organization such as Doctors Without Borders (in South Sudan), the World Literacy Foundation (India) and World Vision (Costa Rica).




MILE (More International Learning Experience)

What it is: A study abroad program, offered through the School of Liberal Arts & Sciences, where Humber students from a variety of academic schools can earn a general education credit. While travelling with a faculty member, students learn about the culture and history of a country or region. Assignments are based on lectures and experiential learning on the trip.

Wow factor: On a recent MILE Italy course, students learned about Cicero, Julius Caesar and St. Augustine, bringing pagan and Christian Rome alive during their time in the Italian capital. In Florence, they took in artworks, tombs, and other important historic sites related to legendary and world historical figures.

"It was fantastic to experience Italian culture first-hand. Taking the course and travelling to Europe was one of the best and most eyeopening experiences of my life."

Screenwriting in Bhutan

What happened: Humber faculty members often teach in other parts of the world. But when Eva Ziemsen, co-ordinator of Humber's Film and Television Production program, was invited to teach a screenwriting course in Bhutan, the experience was truly special. The Bhutanese government's Department of Information and Media was interested in formalizing Bhutan's film industry — up until then, there had never been any kind of film course offered there. Ziemsen condensed her semester-long course for a class of 20 talented and eager students.

Wow factor: Ziemsen is now looking into ways to have her department's lectures recorded so they can be shared with Bhutan. She is also planning to connect second-year Humber screenwriting students with her Bhutanese students as pen pals.

Study tour opportunities

What it is: A 15-week course for Hospitality Tourism students which includes a two-week study tour abroad. The travel component is designed to complement classroom learning.

Wow factor: In a recent Study @ Sea course, students attended interactive lectures and workshops aboard MV Explorer, a "floating university campus," where they studied the politics, history, culture, and natural environment of Central America.

The Humber-NKUHT Study Abroad and Cultural Exchange program

What it is: Through this innovative partnership, third-year students from the National Kaohsiung University of Hospitality & Tourism (NKUHT) in Taiwan visit Canada for just over a year. Following two semesters of study, students go on four-month summer internships across Canada. Starting in January 2012, the program will expand so that Humber's hospitality and tourism students have the chance to study for a semester at NKUHT, followed by a work experience in Kaohsiung or Taipei. The partnership also brings NKUHT faculty to Humber and vice versa.

Wow factor: The level of integrated and immersive learning that the program provides. Students from Kaohsiung attend classes alongside Humber students, and work at hotels, resorts and other popular tourism destinations across Canada.

Field/clinical placement opportunities

What it is: Several of Humber's Health Sciences programs offer opportunities for students to gain invaluable practicum experience in developing countries. In the Occupational Therapist Assistant and Physiotherapist Assistant diploma program, and the Early Childhood - Advanced Studies in Special Needs postgraduate programs, second-year students combine academic studies with a service learning volunteer opportunity in Mexico. Practical Nursing diploma students have a placement opportunity in Tanzania, where they travel to small villages and educate community members in public health clinics and hospitals.

Wow factor: These international opportunities offer full cultural immersion while abroad. Students have a chance to make a difference, from working at a school for children with differing abilities or with adults in long-term care facilities, to addressing important public health topics such as HIV/AIDS, female genital mutilation, and immunization.

Trades Win Support Program

What it is: An 11-week program for internationally trained mechanics, plumbers, millwrights and industrial electricians. Offered in partnership with Skills for Change, a non-profit agency that offers employment programs for Canadian newcomers, the program helps tradespeople build on their expertise and acquire the skills and knowledge they need to prepare for Canadian government qualification exams. Humber also offers a variety of other programs for international professionals, such as the Engineering Software Skills Enhancement Program for mechanical, civil and electrical engineers.

Wow factor: More than 70 per cent of Trades Win Support graduates go on to pass their career qualification exams, allowing them to work in their area of expertise.

The International Centre

What it is: Since the 1970s, Humber has offered programs that help facilitate a smooth transition for international students, who are attracted by Humber's excellent faculty, outstanding resources, and strong, career-focused programming. Today, the International Centre actively recruits students in more than 25 countries and works with other Humber departments to develop new international programs with academic institutions and other partners worldwide. Centre staff offer counselling on topics such as immigration and academic matters; help students find their way around campus and Toronto; and organize social activities and outings. There are two international centres, one located at Humber's North Campus and the other at the Lakeshore Campus. An expansion is now underway to the Lakeshore centre which will be completed in 2012.

Wow factor: Humber has 2,700 international students - more than 10 per cent of the student body – who come from 99 different countries.

Service learning project

What happened: In winter 2011, two Humber staff members led a group of students on a weeklong service learning opportunity in the Dominican Republic. The group volunteered with Orphanage Outreach, an organization that works to transform the lives of orphaned, abandoned and disadvantaged children while providing a personal growth opportunity for international volunteers. The Humber team worked with schoolchildren in the community, teaching English classes and participating in recreational activities.

Wow factor: Children in the Dominican Republic attend school for only half a day. The Humber students knew they were making a difference when some of the children showed up during the remaining half day, when they weren't expected.

In Kenya, children need uniforms to attend school. They also need teachers who are properly trained and a community that values education. At the very root of these things, is a need for the schools themselves. Rumeet Toor, a 28-year-old doctoral student and Humber grad, has seen these challenges and has turned them into opportunities, spearheading initiatives to facilitate education in developing countries.

"Educating myself and providing the opportunity for others to become educated has always been my passion," says Toor. "My parents emigrated from India to Canada so that my siblings and I could receive a quality education. That value has remained important to me ever since."

A committed lifelong learner, Toor's list of academic credentials is impressive. She has an undergraduate degree in Industrial Relations and Sociology, and a Master's in Higher Education, both from the University of Toronto. She also has several certificates, including one in Human Resources Management from Humber College, and is currently pursuing a PhD in Higher Education.

While many students find pursuing postsecondary education sufficiently challenging, Toor also began her professional career during this time. In the second year of her undergraduate degree, she became the president and CEO of Jobs in Education, an employment job board bringing together employers and candidates who are seeking a career in the education sector. While this venture was successful, she developed the desire to make an even greater impact. "I began to explore broader, global issues of education," she says. "I wanted to leave a legacy that was driven by creating social change." Toor became a social entrepreneur and now uses a percentage of the profits from her business to launch various projects that support educational initiatives around the world.

Toor's most recent project is the creation, development, and implementation of The Toor Centre for Teacher Education in rural Kenya. While previously building schools in Ecuador, Toor explored the issues of quality of education and a lack of teacher training, especially in rural areas. She discovered that most teachers' colleges in developing countries are located in cities and the commute is often too long and difficult for most rural residents. And when someone does go to the city for training, they're not likely to come back to the countryside. Her idea was to provide teacher training in rural areas so that most of the students would be able to commute from nearby villages.

Toor took her findings and used them in an assignment in her Master's program, developing a strategic plan to implement a teacher training centre. What started out as a five-year plan on paper, turned into a reality in just one year with the Kikima community in Kenya embracing the idea. Toor worked closely with members of the community who donated an old existing building to become the school. Her organization financed the renovations and provided the startup funding with the goal that the school will be self-sustaining. The school opened last year with 14 students and recently took in 20 more candidates.

Toor's accomplishments in education in developing countries have resulted in numerous accolades. In 2008, she received the honour of being named one of Canada's Top 100 Most Powerful Women in the future leaders category. Since then, she was selected to represent Canada at the 6th Annual UNESCO International Leadership Programme:

A Global Intergenerational Forum, and was a facilitator for the European Regional Forum in Italy. Additionally, she was the Canadian Ambassador for the 1GOAL: Education for

Toor has now come full circle and is teaching a leadership course at Humber. "I am so pleased to be back at Humber in a teaching capacity. This is where I received the foundation for my current work," says Toor. "Now I have the opportunity to share my knowledge and give back."







Increasing your net worth

A comprehensive postsecondary education is one of the best ways of obtaining a sustainable competitive advantage in today's constantly evolving global economy. But, obtaining higher education is an expensive proposition and student debt is a fact of life for many. In fact, according to the 2011 TD Canada Trust Student Finances Survey, 64 per cent expect to graduate with debt hanging over their heads, with one quarter anticipating they will owe more than \$25,000.

As you proceed through your schooling and beyond, your focus will shift from paying for your education to one of paying down your debts. Rather than focusing solely on debt reduction, I would argue that focusing on improving your net worth is a more holistic way of financial planning as it takes into account both the asset and liability side of your personal balance sheet. You can increase net worth either by paying down liabilities or by growing assets or by doing both simultaneously.

Get on top of debt

Take a step by step approach to tackling your debts.

Take stock Make a detailed list of all your outstanding debts and consolidate all your various household debts onto one statement.

Set debt priorities Rank the debts from the highest interest rate to the lowest. As a guideline, you'll want to pay the debts with the highest interest rates down before those with the lowest interest rates.

Boost payments Allocate a portion of each paycheque to debt reduction, and make as large a payment each month as you can. Use tax refunds and bonus pay to make lump sum payments against your debts.

The psychology of saving

Observing the brain with magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), scientists can actually see the brain's pleasure centre lighting up as it gets a rush of a feel-good chemical called dopamine when you buy things. So stop doing battle with your brain and use it to your advantage.

Rewire your brain. Pleasure from most purchases is fleeting. When you find yourself about to buy something that's not an absolute necessity, remind yourself of how little ongoing pleasure you got the last time around, and how guilty you felt.

Make it real. Say you're planning to purchase a home. Visualize the home of your dreams and then picture the party you'll throw. Making a future goal, such as home ownership, tangible will make it easier to put aside for a down payment, instead of a pricey restaurant meal.

Think small. You probably find that a big goal simply can be overwhelming. It's hard to convince yourself it's worth missing a night out in order to save for your retirement that is decades away. A good trick is to break down big goals into smaller and more immediate goals, like tucking away \$100 in to an RRSP each week! Small changes can yield big results. No one can take control of your financial future but you. It's your future, so take
