Reporting and Questions Regarding Freedom of Expression

Enquiries related to freedom of expression, or a complaint are managed through several different offices at the college depending on the nature of the question or concern. The Department of Public Safety, Office of Student Community Standards, and the People(s) & Culture Division facilitate connection to appropriate members of the College staff and would adjudicate the most appropriate avenue for a complaint to be managed. If the complaint is made by someone not connected to the college, it will be directed to Public Safety

In the case of any internal or external event, an initial risk assessment is conducted by the appropriate Booking Authority (individuals or departments who oversee scheduling and space bookings) within the College. Where an event requires additional approval from the Department of Public Safety and Emergency Management, Department of Capital Development and Facilities Management, Student Success and Engagement, the Office of Legal and Risk Management, or another College office/department, the Booking Authority will ensure the required approvals have been obtained by the Applicant. If additional security or safety measures are required to host the event and mitigate additional risks and concerns, the Department of Public Safety and the Booking Authority will work with the party interested in hosting the event to communicate the need and, if necessary, related additional costs, etc. in advance of approving the event.

During the reporting period there were no instances where a non-curricular event did not proceed due to security concerns or their related costs. Additional information is provided below.

Complaints

Between August 1, 2024, and July 31, 2025, no official/formal complaints were made by members of the institutional community (or guests) about free speech.

Non-Curricular Events

Total: 1680 (1370 non-curricular events and 310 Varsity games). This information contains both in-person and virtual events.



Additional Comments or Notes:

On November 21, 2024, a protest in response to the war in Israel and Gaza was held at the Lakeshore Campus. Around 20 people attended the event and marched around the Campus. The Department of Public Safety observed but did not intervene though the organizers did not obtain the required event permit as per the Temporary Use of Space for Events Policy and Procedures.
