Feedback is more than just grades

Feedback is a vital part of the knowledge and skills acquisition process. It can also engage and motivate students to learn. Too often, however, teachers and students think of feedback as an evaluation that takes place at the end of the learning process. In this workshop, you'll explore the different ways that formative feedback can help learners and teachers communicate expectations and reflect on what's working (and what isn't) in the class to facilitate learning. You'll learn practical strategies that you can use in your classes right away.

Making Groups Work

Team work and collaboration are skills that prospective employers value, but when our students' group work does not work, they are less likely to develop the very skills that employers value and their attitudes toward collaboration may get jaded. In this workshop, we will relate research on group work and group development to proactive strategies for group formation, maintenance, and performance.

Principles of Universal Design for Learning (UDL)

This proactive model provides guidelines that faculty can use to optimize the experience for all learners by adopting an inclusive approach to educational design. In this workshop participants will examine the fundamentals of UDL and discuss how to apply them to their own teaching practice.

Teacher as Coach




