

Introducing Page 1+, the powerful new resource search tool from College Libraries Ontario (CLO).


Humber Libraries, along with 19 other college libraries across the province, will be transitioning to Page 1+ on August 2.

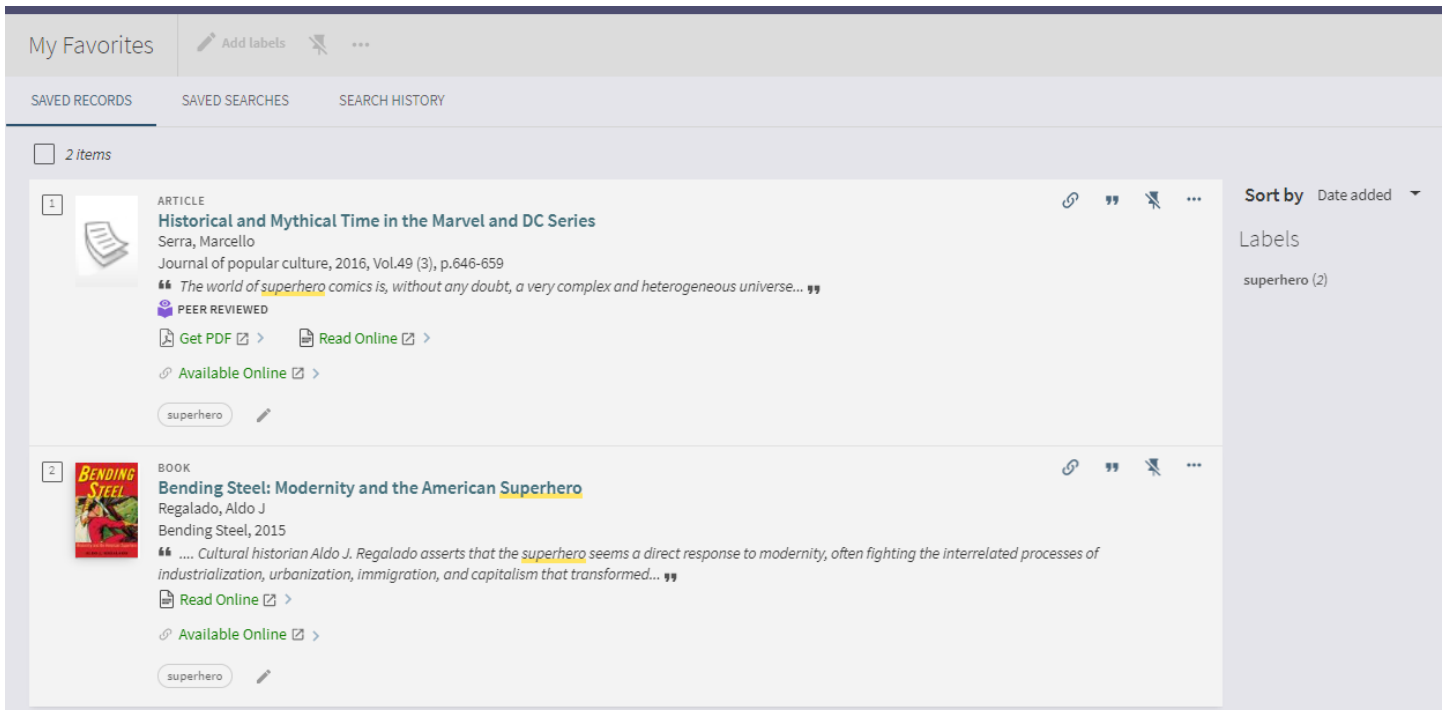

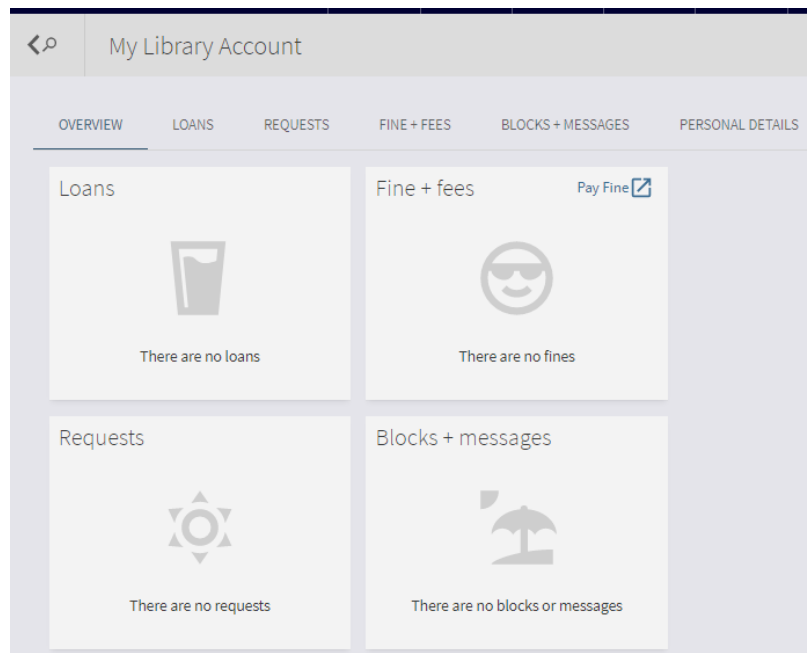
